the President, governors and mayors join in proclaiming

Sunday, June 12, 2016 as "Children's Day"?

Since 2007, the governor of the state of **Illinois** has

proclaimed "**Children's Day**" on *the second Sunday in June*. Also such cities as

Aurora, Ill.; Batavia, Ill.; Fort Collins, Colo.; Vancouver, Wash.; to name a few, have

issued past proclamations.

John Ross, advocate for **Children's Day** and part of a movement spear-headed by the website, www.nationalchildrensday.us, expressed his hope for further expansion of the day.

"I am so pleased with the past responses from Illinois governors in issuing proclamations. The ongoing work of individuals, churches, and organizations for the day speaks volumes to its potential in 2016 for state and local proclamations and beyond."

Children's Day observations in the United States predate both Mother's and Father's Day. The day to celebrate children dates from the 1860s and earlier. The Methodist Episcopal Church at the Methodist Conference of 1868 recommended that *the second Sunday in June* be observed annually as **Children's Day**. The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in 1883 designated the "the second Sabbath in June as *Children's Day*."

Chase’s Calendar of Events cites Children’s Sunday and notes that The Commonwealth of Massachusetts issues an annual proclamation for *the second Sunday in June*.

Numerous churches and denominations currently observe *the second Sunday in June* including the African Methodist Episcopal Church, African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church, and the Christian Methodist Episcopal Church.

The ***Children’s Day*** website, www.nationalchildrensday.us, offers helps and also challenges parents, individuals, churches/houses of worship, schools/places of education, government/community and businesses to sign commitment cards directed at affirming America’s children. They pledge to “commit myself (ourselves), in the coming year, to love, cherish, nurture (physical, mental, emotional, & spiritual needs), and affirm...” They can also make a commitment beyond America to the world’s children.
